FOYNES COURT

Possession of Blasting Powder
TWO DEFENDANTS FINED

On Monday the monthly District Court was held at Foynes, Mr. P. O'Donoghue, B.L., District Justice, adjudicating.

For the fifth time, the case of Mr. W. H. O'Brien, now an Inspector under the Land Commission, against Mrs. Ellen Kelly, Shanagolden, arising out of failure on the part of the latter to pay by instalments, as ordered by a superior court, a debt due by her to Mr. O'Brien, came before the court. At the previous court the case was adjourned pending Mrs. Kelly's receipt of permission from the Land Commission to sell portion of her farm to liquidate the debt. The farm is now advertised for sale on the 29th inst., and the case was adjourned temporarily to next court (at Foynes) on the 23rd May, the Justice intimating that there will be no further adjournment.

Mr. P. Liston, junr. (P. T. Liston and Co.), solr., Rathkeale, who represented plaintiff, was allowed two minutes extra for UNLICENSED VEHICLES. Guard McHugh, Foynes, summoned John Leahy, Leashes, Foynes; Patrick Wall, Aghalane, Barrigonee; Patrick Morrissey, Aghalane; Thomas Corbett, Corgigg, Foynes; and William Kirwan, Foynes, under the Lights on Vehicles Act. Leahy was fined 7s. 6d.; Wall and Morrissey, 2s. each; Corbett, 1s., and Kirwan, 1s.

Guard O'Sullivan, Foynes, summoned a boy Smith, 18 Catherine Street, Limerick, for having no right light on his omnibus. Time for attendance at court not being given in summons, case was marked D.W.P. ROAD NUISANCE. Sergeant McCormack, Glin, summoned James Dillane, Glin, for driving a motor car without a driver's licence, and was fined 7s. 6d. CROWDED OMBUSSES. Sergeant McCormack, Glin, summoned John Smith, 18 Catherine Street, Limerick, for parking an omnibus in his omnibus. The defendant was fined 2s.

TOO MANY ON LOBBY. Same complainant summoned Daniel Perry, Glin, for parking an omnibus in his omnibus for passenger purposes, and owned by Cosell Brothers, Glin, 21 passengers, 17 being the number legally permitted. Fined 1s. VIOLATION OF BY-LAWS. At the suit of the Attorney-General Cornelius O'Brien and Miss Helena Irwin, No. 12, Slanequill, were charged with having in their possession an ammunition (blasting powder) without authority. Supt. Levin conducted the prosecution. Mr. P. Liston, junr., solr., represented both defendants.

The Superintendent stated that Miss Irwin admitted that the powder was in her possession for years, and she did not know a certificate was required. The Supt. also said that at first O'Brien denied, and afterwards admitted, getting the powder from Miss Irwin. Liston admitted the charge, and stated there was a quarry on Miss Irwin's land. The powder had been lying over, and Miss Irwin did not know about it. A fine of 10s. was imposed. RENEWAL OF LICENSE. The Irish-American Oil Company applied for a renewal of petroleum licence for the purpose of supplying the Foynes. Mr. P. J. O'Sullivan, solr., and Mr. Quindlan, the Company's District Manager, represented the company.

Mr. O'Sullivan, on behalf of Miss A. Madden, N.T., whose residence is near one of the tanks, objected to the renewal. The Justice stated that at his request Mr. O'Dwyer, Chief Inspector of streets, was sent down and inspected the oil works. He reported that the house was not in danger. The renewal was granted.

ANNUAL RETREAT FOR ARCH-CONFRATERNITY

The annual retreat for the men of St. John's Division of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family in Limerick was opened in the Heliopolis Church at 8 o'clock on Monday night by the Rev. Father O'Brien, C.S.B.R. There was a crowded congregation present, which included the members of St. John's Brass and Reed Band, who played to and returned from the church. The spiritual exercises of the retreat are being conducted by both Father O'Brien and Father Brady, two well-known Missionaries of the Redeemer Order. Next week the men of St. Michael's Division will make their retreat, and on the following week the men of the recently formed third division of St. Clement Hofbauer.

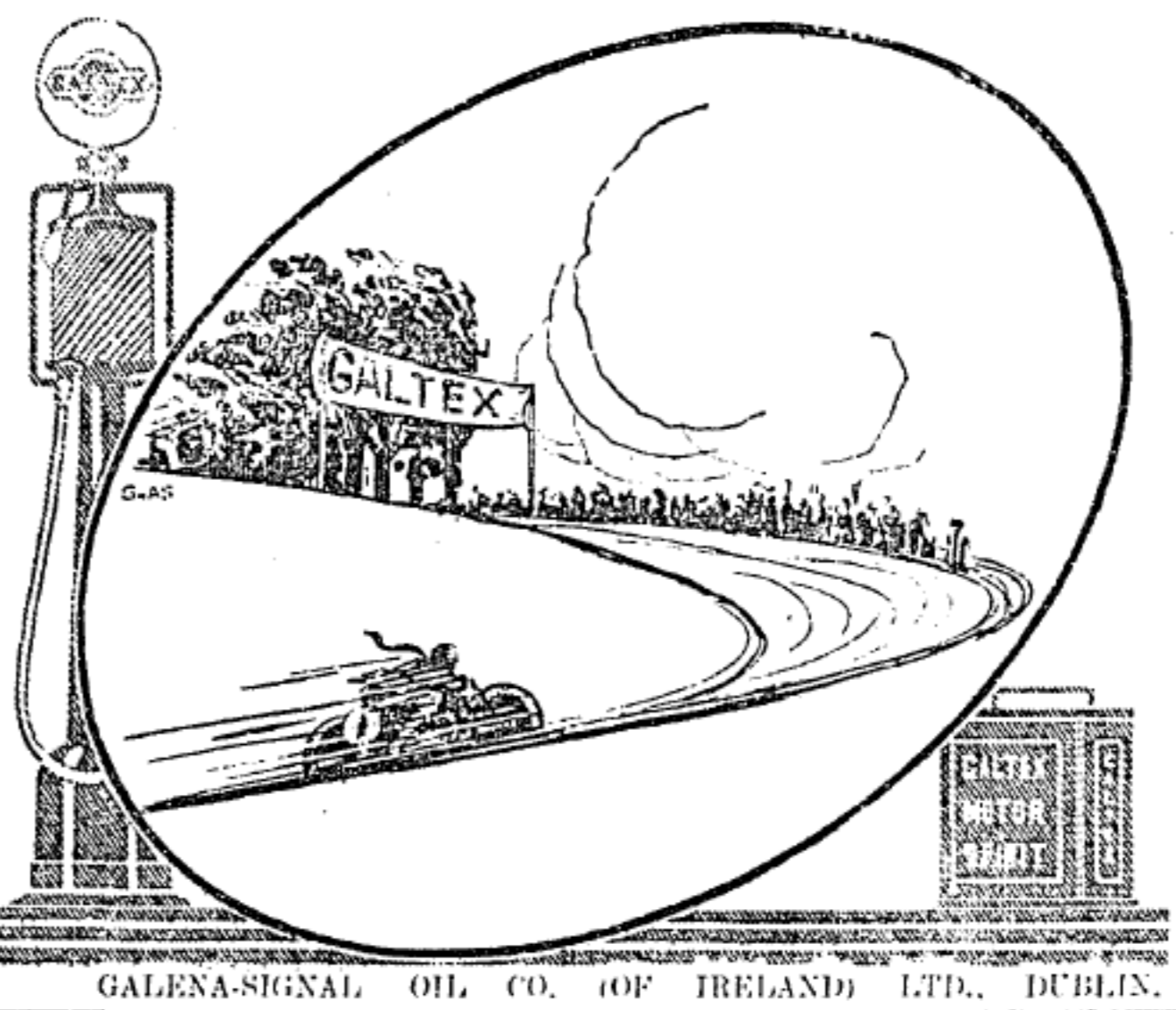
